
Implementation

In line with the Devon and Torbay agreed syllabus 2019, teaching aims to encourage all children to explore core Bible texts, examine the impact for Christians and consider possible implications.

- Identify and make sense of core religious and non- religious beliefs and concepts. To understand what these beliefs mean within their traditions, recognising how and why sources of authority, such as texts are used, expressed and interpreted in different ways, and developing skills of interpretation.
- 2. To understand the impact by explain how and why people put their beliefs into action in diverse ways, within their everyday lives, within their communities and in the wider world. For children to appreciate and appraise the significance of different ways of life and ways of expressing meaning.
- 3. To make connections by evaluation, reflecting on and connecting the beliefs and practices studied; allowing pupils to challenge ideas studied and the ideas studied to challenge pupils' thinking; discerning possible connections between these and pupils' own lives and ways of understanding the World.

At Otterton and Drake's Church of England primary schools we are

committed to providing our children with an exciting and positive learning environment, in which they have the opportunity to develop their knowledge and understanding of religions while contributing to their spiritual, moral social and cultural development. Our teachers choose how to weave together the elements, from making sense of the text, through looking at the impact on the world of the Christian, and helping to make connections with the world of the pupil, in order to achieve the outcomes.



RE is taught across all year groups in school. As pupils progress through the school they build on their prior knowledge by comparing the religions and beliefs that have been studied and having the chance to question, dive deeper and be reflective. Teachers plan effectively, ensuring that key dates and religious festivals are consistently explored and celebrated. The children of Otterton and Drake's C of E Primary schools have opportunities to visit places of worship and have a strong link with the local churches, visiting them weekly for collective worships. Open the book are very popular amongst the children, where they get the opportunities to help retell bible stories to the whole school community. When possible children visit places of worship linked to their studies, for example the Mosque and Synagogue.
